

OASIS Methodological Guide for Participatory Local Actions

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I. Introduction

The aim of this guide, elaborated in the framework of winEU.rur project: *Participatory governance for the European Union cultural- historical values of traditional agricultural landscapes*, financed by the EU CERV Programme 21-27, is to provide a structured and adaptable methodology to develop an EU Strategy of participative governance for the protection, promotion, and valorization of traditional agricultural vineyard landscapes, applicable to diverse European rural territories.

Drawing inspiration from the principles of the "OASIS Game", created by the Elos Institute, renowned for its emphasis on community mobilization and participatory processes, this methodology caters to stakeholders interested in sustainable tourism, community development, and the enhancement of European vine landscapes.

The primary objective is to harness collective intelligence, co-creating materials that facilitate sustainable cultural tourism management and participative governance in traditional agricultural vineyard landscapes. Distinct outcomes include the development of:

- The Joint report and mapping of experiences of sustainable tourism for the promotion and enhancement of European vineyard landscapes
- The Joint itinerary for the implementation of innovative technologies for the management of cultural tourism in scattered sites
- The Joint itinerary for the implementation of sustainable cultural tourism management measures
- And finally, the EU Strategy of Participative Governance for the Protection, Promotion, and Valorization of Traditional Agricultural Vineyard Landscapes, which encompasses all the above.

Moreover, the Methodology also foresees the engagement of participants in the Virtual Forum for the opinion collection (WIKI platform), a tool developed within the project to gather the experiences, suggestions and insights of the general public and stakeholders.

❖ *Additional Information:*

The methodology is crafted to be a valuable resource for individuals and organizations invested in the preservation and promotion of European vine landscapes. Its adaptability ensures relevance across various contexts and geographical settings, making it a versatile tool for stakeholders with diverse interests in sustainable tourism and community well-being. The emphasis on the "OASIS" methodology principles further underscores the commitment to

fostering community engagement and collaborative processes throughout the methodology's implementation.

II. Methodology Overview

a. What You Will Find in This Guide

This guide unfolds a participatory methodology tailored for sustainable tourism and the enhancement of European vine landscapes. Drawing from the "OASIS" approach, it accentuates community engagement and social innovation.

The ultimate goal of this guide is to share a simple, replicable methodology in the different territories of all the project partners, inspired by the OASIS game, a social technology for community mobilisation undertaken by the ELOS Institute.

It is especially aimed at facilitators of these processes, those who take on the role of accompanying the activation of a participatory governance strategy, whether they are external to the process or part of the promoter group, as well as anyone else interested in the design and implementation of participatory methodologies for social innovation.

b. OASIS Methodology as Inspiration

Our methodology artfully adapts the foundational elements of the "OASIS" framework, recognizing its emphasis on community mobilization and participatory processes. The participatory approach unfolds in several phases, each inspired by the "OASIS" methodology:

Appreciative Gaze:

- Participants embark on an exploration, identifying and appreciating the unique qualities and potential of European vine landscapes.

Affection:

- Dive deeper into the landscapes, exploring elements that hold value for sustainable tourism and community engagement.

Dreaming:

- Encourage the emergence of individual and collective visions for sustainable tourism within European vine landscapes.

Care:

- Define actionable steps and allocate resources required to realize the envisioned sustainable tourism initiatives.

Action:

- Implement plans for sustainable tourism initiatives, putting the defined actions into motion.

Celebration:

- Acknowledge achievements and milestones in promoting sustainable tourism and preserving European vine landscapes.

The first five phases of the OASIS Methodology (Appreciative gaze, Affection, Dreaming, Care & Action) will be implemented in the six Participatory Local Actions, one in each winEU.rur partner country: Spain, Bulgaria, Italy, Croatia, Portugal and Slovenia. The sixth phase, Celebration, will be developed at the end of the project, together with the 7th International Event in Spain.

III. The Participatory Local Actions

The Methodology is devised to steer the organization of six Participatory Local Actions, one in each partner country (Spain, Bulgaria, Italy, Croatia, Portugal and Slovenia), regarding the first five phases of the OASIS Methodology: 1) Appreciative gaze; 2) Affection; 3) Dreaming; 4) Care & 5) Action.

These sessions are centred on three main topics:

- 1) Sustainable tourism for the promotion and enhancement of European vineyard landscapes.
- 2) Innovative technologies for the management of cultural tourism in scattered sites.
- 3) Sustainable cultural tourism management measures.

These three topics will encompass each country “EU Strategy of participative governance for the protection, promotion, and valorization of traditional agricultural vineyard landscapes”, which be elaborated subsequently by each partner territory responsible for the action.

a. Description of the Methodology

What does this methodological proposal entail for the development of a participatory methodology targeting sustainable tourism within European vineyard landscapes? While numerous approaches exist, tailoring the methodology to this specific context is crucial. The methodology prompts reflection on key questions to guide the creation of a targeted approach:

Group Involvement:

- What group will be involved in the methodology's implementation? What are their backgrounds and levels of familiarity with participatory methodologies?

Challenges and Considerations:

- Are there any specific challenges related to sustainable tourism in European vine landscapes that need consideration?

Primary Goals:

- What are the primary goals of this participatory event? Is the aim to foster collective intelligence, co-create sustainable tourism initiatives, or identify new opportunities within European vine landscapes?

Time Allocation:

- How much time is available for the implementation of this methodology?

Depending on the responses to these questions, the methodology can be shaped to suit the particular needs of the territory where it is implemented. Seeking advice or insights from other teams involved in similar participatory processes can provide additional guidance.

b. Implementing the OASIS Methodology

Here you can find a proposal for the implementation of the first five phases of the methodology, designed to facilitate a 4-hour group working session.

➤ *Welcome and presentation (40 min)*

The opening is always a very important moment in collective spaces. The people involved introduce themselves, the meaning of the session is explained, and a friendly atmosphere for participation is created. It is important to dedicate time and ensure that this time is of quality, as well as to not overextend so the group won't be tired before the work starts.

In this phase, the facilitators introduce themselves and present the goals for the session. It may be interesting to mention the framework of the project and the goal of the session, creating an EU Strategy of participative governance for the protection, promotion, and valorization of traditional agricultural vineyard landscapes, if everyone does not have this information at hand. The facilitation team makes the agenda known, and the participants are introduced.

For the presentation:

- In this phase we chose to combine two techniques: the first, quick round where participants share their names and which organisation they come from.

- Then, all stand up, walk around the room and choose one of the participants. Then, in pairs each person must tell the other in a timeframe of two minutes their motivations related to sustainable tourism within European vine landscapes. The exchange is repeated two more times, encouraging crossover and getting to know each other.

Materials:

- It can be useful to have a small digital presentation with the contents.
- A panel that helps to keep to the agenda, the different moments of the session, time, etc.

Having established some familiarity among participants, let's proceed to the next phase!

➤ ***Phase 1 & 2: Appreciative gaze & Affection (30 min.)***

In this phase a search is made for what is the potential of creating new tourist experiences for the promotion and valorisation of European vine landscapes. Understanding that tourism is a network of interrelated places, actors and experiences being very dynamic and volatile, but at the same time resilient to co-create new opportunities for tourism experiences, it requires not only technical knowledge and data, but also a lot of sensitivity, empathy and creativity.

Moreover, in this phase we also aim to find the story behind each potential tourist experience that can be implemented in rural territories for the promotion and valorisation of European vine landscapes detected at the local level.

To do so, firstly we will identify best practices or initiatives that are already being implemented in the territory, that relate to the three main topics of the session:

- 1) Sustainable tourism for the promotion and enhancement of European vineyard landscapes.
- 2) Innovative technologies for the management of cultural tourism in scattered sites.
- 3) Sustainable cultural tourism management measures.

Therefore, facilitators explain the methodology and contents to be addressed, and present the three key topics of the session.

To initiate the identification of BBPP:

- The participants are asked to organize into groups; 4 or 5 people can be a good number.



- We give them a worksheet (Worksheet I: Identification) with the following questions: *What is happening in my territory that is already moving towards these goals? What do we value about it?*
- Participants spend approximately 10 minutes individually noting down their thoughts on Post-It notes or cards, separating projects in one colour and values in another. Each note should represent a single idea.
- Finally, participants are given another 10 to 15 min to share the experiences, practices, etc. that were identified in each small group.

Materials:

- Worksheet I: Identification.
- Writing instruments.
- Post-It notes or large cards in two different colours.

➤ **Phase 3: Dreaming (40 min)**

Following the initial identification of best practices and/or initiatives, the focus shifts towards collectively envisioning sustainable tourism within European vine landscapes. Participants are encouraged to imagine a future scenario where the identified values and qualities have been fully realized by 2033, employing the metaphor of nurturing a seed into fruition.

An example can provide guidance: *Consider a cooperative initiative within European vine landscapes that promotes sustainability tourism and inclusivity. Visualize how the landscapes would appear with enhanced sustainability and inclusivity, contemplating the transformations that would occur.*

The aim here is to foster coherent dreaming among participants, understanding the transformative power this holds for sustainable tourism. We are aiming for plausible yet uncertain futures, envisioning an ideal scenario with a degree of uncertainty.

To initiate Dream phase:

- Participants are given the Worksheet II: Dream, which they have to complete individually. Post-it are also needed in this stage, as required in the Worksheet. This should last only a few minutes.
- Facilitators hand out some A1 panels or similar, for each small group. Once the individual time is over, they share their ideas with the group, while drawing and writing their dreams on the panel.

- Afterwards, the ideas are shared with the group, illustrating and describing their collective visions on a large panel, where all the group panels are collected.

Key considerations at this stage:

- Someone in the group should act as rapporteur, taking notes of all the ideas shared and then presenting them to the larger group.
- There is no need to reach agreements or debate, all ideas are welcome.
- It is important to remember the co-responsibility for the session's goals and the need for self-management in these groups, being aware of the time and so that everyone can express their ideas.

Materials:

- Worksheet II: Dream.
- Writing instruments, preferably markers and pens.
- Large panel for illustrating the collective vision.
- Post-it.

➤ **Break (20 min)**

Considering the energy intensity these sessions demand, taking a break is essential. It would be good to have a table with snacks and drinks, if they are of responsible consumption and local, even better!

➤ **Phase 4: Care (30 min)**

Post the break, each group shares panels illustrating their collective visions. The designated note-taker from each group presents the key ideas from their panel to the larger group within approximately 3 minutes. Subsequently, group members can add missing details. This phase aims to avoid prolonged discussions and instead encourages a brief yet impactful exchange of ideas. Applause marks the celebration of shared ideas.

When all groups have shared their dream, we can take a moment to look at the panels and ask ourselves what we see: What catches our attention? Are there ideas that are repeated a lot? Is there one that is particularly original? Is something missing? What is this narrative we have collectively imagined telling us?

Materials:

- Masking tape or similar for affixing panels to the wall.

➤ **Phase 5: Action (60 min)**

In this final step, the results of the previous phases will be reflected in the EU Strategy of participative governance for the protection, promotion, and valorization of traditional agricultural vineyard landscapes of each country participating in the project through the Participatory local actions.

To prepare the Strategy:

- We invite participants with an individual exercise (Worksheet III: Strategy) in which they have to answer: *What action could I do, from my project or field of work, to go towards this dream?* The worksheet includes the fields title / description of the action / resources needed. 5 to 10 minutes are provided for this task.
- When everyone is finished, we stand up, leave the sheets for the actions face down on the floor, shuffle them, and pick one up again, which is not our own. The worksheets, in addition to the description fields, have a rating scale. We read the proposal we were given, and score it on the basis of the items marked. Then, we put the worksheets back, shuffle them again, and repeat the operation with two more proposals.
- When this process of reading and scoring comes to an end, we do a count in the large group. We share the proposals that have the highest scores. In a way, those are the ones that the group values as the most interesting, and that could mark the initial EU Strategy for participative governance for the protection, promotion and valorization of traditional agricultural vineyard landscapes. The remaining actions can be collected in a report to be shared with the participants, as a sort of bank of inspiring actions or activities to be developed at another stage.

Materials:

- Worksheet III: Strategy
- Writing materials

➤ **Closing (15 min)**

This phase summarizes the achieved results and outlines the next steps. Acknowledging and appreciating the participants' contributions of time, skills, and knowledge is crucial.

The session is closed with a small assessment. For this, we use two tools:



- One, an open round in case someone wants to share a word or phrase about the impact the session has had on them, what they have gained from it, etc. It is not compulsory to speak, only those who would like sharing something should do it.
- The other, an individual written assessment questionnaire, where participants can record their general satisfaction with the development of the session, as well as possible indications to improve it or other processes in future sessions (Worksheet IV).

Materials:

- Worksheet IV: Evaluation
- Writing materials

The session is now closed! Giving some extra time may also be a good time for casual conversations among the participants. Remember to carefully collect all the information generated.

c. Considerations

Each facilitator has their own way of doing things, and each group also requires different care. However, here are some general recommendations that may be helpful:

Pre-Session:

- Identifying and inviting relevant stakeholders aligned with sustainable tourism in European vine landscapes is critical. Quality pre-session information ensures clarity and enhances participant engagement.
- The selection of an adequate venue, equipped with technical resources and prepared visual facilitation tools, amplifies session effectiveness.

During the Event:

- Particular attention is devoted to ensuring all participants comprehend the session's content and dynamics, emphasizing clarity through illustrative examples.
- Recognizing participants' personal commitments, an accurately managed timeline aids punctuality and allows for necessary adjustments.

Post-Session:



- Facilitators diligently collect and organize the information generated during the session. This may be compiled into a digital document for future references.
- A closing email, echoing next steps and sharing collected information, serves to reinforce engagement and provide a sense of continuity.

IV. Methodological Process Guide to Celebrate Achievements

a. What you will find in this guide

This section serves as a comprehensive guide for designing and executing a successful "International Forum for Participatory Governance of Traditional Agricultural Landscape," focusing on co-creation, collective intelligence, and sustainable tourism opportunities in European wine landscapes using the "OASIS" methodology. It provides step-by-step instructions, practical insights, and illustrative examples to facilitate the planning and execution of a meaningful and impactful event.

b. The OASIS Methodology as inspiration

The "OASIS" methodology, centered on strategic planning and project execution, can serve as a valuable source of inspiration for structuring the Forum for Celebrating Achievements. It offers key ideas for designing and implementing an event that promotes co-creation, collective intelligence, and sustainable tourism in European wine landscapes. Using the celebration phase of the OASIS methodology, the adapted approach involves:

- **Setting clear objectives:** Adapting the methodology to focus on presenting project outcomes and fostering discussion on participatory governance in wine landscapes.
- **Identifying stakeholders:** Recognizing and engaging diverse stakeholders, including local communities, viticulture experts, tourism agencies, environmental organizations, and cultural institutions to ensure diverse participation and informed decision-making.
- **Planning activities:** Integrating the final project event activities within the "OASIS" methodology framework.



- **Strategies for efficient implementation:** Focusing on the effective execution of planned activities during the forum to ensure a smooth and impactful experience for participants, encouraging collaboration and collective intelligence.
- **Continuous monitoring and evaluation:** Advocating for continuous evaluation processes, including participant feedback mechanisms, impact assessments, and reflection sessions, to measure the event's effectiveness and identify improvement areas or other opportunities in sustainable tourism initiatives.
- **Alignment with long-term goals:** Ensuring that the event aligns with the broader objectives of promoting sustainable tourism, fostering community engagement, and preserving the cultural and environmental heritage of European wine landscapes.

c. Description of the Methodology

➤ *Introduction to the International Forum for Participatory Governance of Traditional Agricultural Landscape*

The "International Forum for Participatory Governance of Traditional Agricultural Landscape" represents a key initiative within the winEU.rur project, and it will be celebrated in Spain in the framework of the 7th International Event. This Forum is aimed at highlighting and promoting co-creation, collective intelligence, and sustainable tourism in European wine landscapes. Its main purpose is to highlight significant achievements, drive innovative approaches, and stimulate collaboration among diverse stakeholders.

- **Day 1: Focus on Project Partners:** This day is exclusively reserved for project partners and focuses on the Transnational Project Coordination Meeting (TCM3), accompanied by informal cultural activities. The activities on this day seek to strengthen relationships among partners and conduct a strategic review of project progress and future plans. Since these activities focus on internal coordination and consolidating the team of partners, a detailed participatory methodology for this day is not contemplated, unlike the subsequent days of the forum.
- **Day 2: Seminar and Conference**
 - **Seminar on Capitalization and Transfer of Results:** We will implement interactive methodologies to analyze project outcomes, focusing on their practical application.
 - **“winEU.rur” Conference:** Includes presentations and panels exploring sustainable tourism and participatory governance themes, encouraging dialogue and idea exchange.

- **Day 3: Closing Session and Hackathon**
 - **Closing Session and Exhibition:** We will highlight project achievements, emphasizing key learnings and discussing future directions.
 - **Citizen Debate Forum – Hackathon:** We will promote co-creation and the development of innovative solutions through a hackathon approach, focusing on specific challenges in sustainable tourism in wine landscapes.

This methodological approach ensures that each day of the International Forum is strategically aligned with the overall objectives of the winEU.rur project, maximizing participation, learning, and collaboration at all levels.

➤ **Objectives and Purpose**

The methodology aims to achieve the following objectives:

- **Celebrating Achievements in Sustainable Tourism:** Recognize and celebrate the milestones reached in sustainable tourism initiatives within European wine landscapes, highlighting the project's progress and successes.
- **Exchange and Co-Creation of Best Practices, Experiences, and Innovative Ideas:** Facilitate an interactive space for the exchange and co-creation of best practices, experiences, trends, and knowledge. The intention is to foster joint creation of solutions and strategies leading to smart, sustainable, and inclusive growth of traditional agricultural landscapes. This includes driving new tourism experiences and improving sustainable tourism opportunities, leveraging collective intelligence and collaborative innovation to valorize and preserve the cultural and natural heritage of European wine landscapes.
- **Engaging Key Stakeholders:** Actively involve key stakeholders, including local communities, experts, businesses, and policymakers, to ensure broad representation and inclusive, participatory decision-making.
- **Fostering European Citizenship and Active Participation in the EU's Democratic and Rural Life:** Stimulate the development of active European citizenship, promoting participation in European democratic life and rural affairs. This comprehensive approach seeks to valorize the cultural and natural (tangible and intangible) heritage of rural communities, while improving conditions for rural population participation in debates about the future of Europe's traditional agricultural landscapes. This objective also encompasses governance and the search for sustainable and digital adaptation solutions in rural development, thus reinforcing commitment to the heritage, culture, and sustainable development of Europe's rural areas.

➤ **Program**

The Forum program is meticulously designed to provide an immersive and enriching experience:

Day 2: Seminar and Conference

Seminar on Capitalization and Transfer of Results

This seminar is an integral part of the International Forum for Participatory Governance of Traditional Agricultural Landscape and focuses on maximizing the impact and applicability of the winEU.rur project results.

- **Duration:** 3 hours

- **Structure:**

 - Summary of key data and success metrics of the project.
 2. *Exhibition of Projects and Results*
 - **Objective:** Tangibly display the project results and provide concrete examples of their application and effect.
 - **Structure:**
 - Exhibition stands or spaces with visual materials, such as posters, brochures, and videos.
 - Interactive demonstrations of tools or methods developed in the project.
 - Opportunity for visitors to interact with the project creators and delve into details.
 3. *Discussion on Future Steps and Sustainability*
 - **Objective:** Reflect on the lessons learned and discuss strategies for the future, focusing on how to maintain and expand the project's efforts.
 - **Structure:**
 - Roundtable with project leaders and experts in rural development and sustainable tourism.
 - Brainstorming session with all participants to generate ideas on how to continue and expand the work done.
 - Commitment to action: establish concrete goals and steps for the coming months and years.

Each of these activities is designed to complement and enhance the learning and collaboration from the Capitalization and Transfer of Results Seminar and the "winEU.rur"

Conference, ensuring that the Closure Session and Exhibition serves as a powerful conclusion and starting point for future initiatives.

Citizen Debate Forum – Hackathon

This Forum represents a unique opportunity to practically apply the principles and objectives of the winEU.rur project, focusing on innovation and the active participation of attendees in creating solutions for challenges related to sustainable tourism and governance in traditional agricultural landscapes.

- **Duration:** 5 hours
- **Objective:** Generate innovative solutions to specific challenges.
- **Activities:**
 1. *Introduction and Team Formation*
 - **Objective:** Establish the framework of the hackathon and form multidisciplinary teams.
 - **Structure:**
 - Brief introduction to the objectives and rules of the hackathon.
